Our Values


- We value integrity, inclusiveness, and courage in the stewardship of philanthropic resources;

Building the Social Capital Account

In an annual report like this one, the natural inclination for many of us is to look back and try to assess 2007 “by the numbers.” What was the total dollar amount of new contributions? How many funds are we managing now? How much grant and scholarship money did we award?

These are all important measures of the Community Foundation’s impact, and you will find these and many other significant indicators in this report. However, to get a complete picture of what we accomplished in the community, we have to consider more than dollar signs. For financial resources to achieve maximum benefit in the community, they must be used in ways that reflect the shared passion of people. The relationships, trust, commitment to civic engagement, and unity of purpose that develop when individuals come together to become a family of givers are the most powerful resource in successful philanthropy. Social capital is the energy that, when combined with monetary capital from donors, transforms what might otherwise be a detached, obligatory gesture into genuine engagement in the work for a more positive future.

Creating an environment where social capital can compound and appreciate in value is as much a part of the Community Foundation’s mission as managing funds and making grants. In the pages that follow, we will share just a few examples of how the Community Foundation enables givers to engage in meaningful dialog about what the community needs, and convenes people to leverage their philanthropic activities into a common bond that connects them to something bigger than themselves. In many ways, social capital is an intangible, difficult-to-define asset, but as you will readily see in this report, the difference social capital makes in multiplying the impact of community philanthropy is unmistakable.

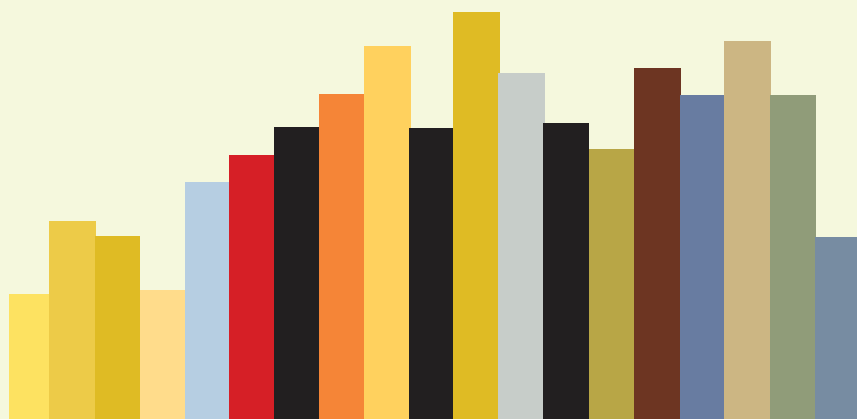
As an organization charged to shape effective responses to community issues, the Community Foundation invests philanthropic capital to generate social capital. In this annual report, you will read about the exciting progress we are making, the lives we are touching, and the social capital we are developing. Yet there is still more to do.

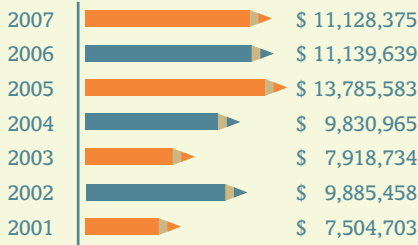

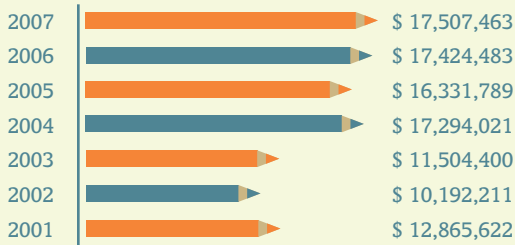
Supporting Social Capital With Financial Resources

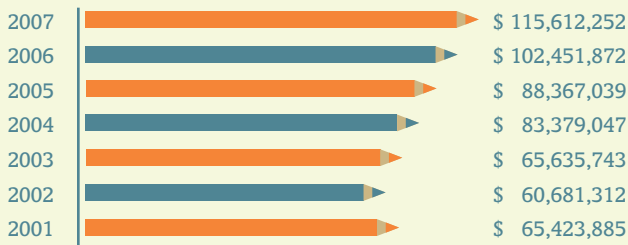
Grants to Nonprofits

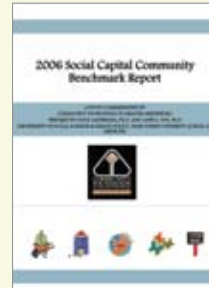

Benchmark Study reveals strengths and areas for improvement

In March, 2007, Greensboro released the results of its second Social Capital Benchmark Study, a follow-up to the initial 2000 results. These findings are important because research shows that communities with strong social capital are safer, have healthier citizens, produce students who do better in school, and see increased economic development.

This study showed that Greensboro has improved in many categories: monetary giving, volunteerism, church attendance, interracial trust, friendships, and interaction.

Yet, there are a number of areas where improvement is clearly needed. A decline was noted in participation in political/social action organizations, in residents taking formal leadership roles in community groups, and in trusting other citizens, local governments, and police.

"We are pleased in many respects about the progress Greensboro is making," said Dr. Johnnetta Cole, former President of Bennett College and chair of the Foundation's Social Capital Task Force. "However, we still need to build trust in each other, and we need a cohesive vision to address our weaknesses. This report is but a benchmark; our destiny is in our own hands."

There are now 96 new “change agents” among us

Following the release of the Social Capital Benchmark Study, it was apparent that there were areas of concern that needed immediate attention. Here at the Community Foundation, one of our most often overlooked functions is bringing people together to facilitate solutions. Partnering with the City of Greensboro’s Human Relations Commission and the UNCG Center for Youth, Family, and Community Partnerships, we created an initiative called IMPACT Greensboro, building on strengths of the former Mosaic Project.

The nucleus of IMPACT Greensboro is the “change agents,” individuals who are committed to building social capital through building trust and relationships. They are bringing new voices and new perspectives to community issues such as race relations, education, economics, and the quality of neighborhoods. These volunteers reflect the diversity in the city’s population in terms of race, age, economic situation, and residence. They will not only learn and discuss our core issues, but they will develop strategies to address them.

“We will build understanding and respect for each other,” said Mona Edwards, IMPACT Greensboro chair. “We have more in common than we realize. As we build bridges of trust among ourselves, we will spread that trust everywhere we go—at work, in our faith communities, among our social connections. It will improve our community; that is why it is called ‘IMPACT Greensboro.’ ”

Social Capital Is Civic Leadership

One generous gift that made so many more gifts possible

This year we honored the 10th anniversary of a fund that has had a significant and lasting impact on the Community Foundation and our mission. The Morris and Margaret Howell Fund for Initiatives was established in 1997 as a result of a bequest in Mr. Howell's will.

Richard Wharton, the Howells' attorney, said at the time that Mr. Howell had a rare understanding about the value of philanthropy. "During his lifetime, Morris Howell made his own choices, but he knew he could not foresee what would be best in the future—so he elected not to choose beneficiaries. He left that to the Community Foundation to decide."

The \$9 million bequeathed to the Foundation was crucial in allowing us to make a significant impact in the community. Our first major grant in honor of receiving the gift was \$125,000 to the Greensboro Public Library for computers and homework stations throughout the branch system.

Since that time, the Howell Fund has provided seed money for virtually every major project we have undertaken. From the Building Stronger Neighborhoods Program, to the Guilford Community AIDS Partnership, to programs for the arts, schools, nonprofit capacity, and teens, the Howell Fund continues to build social capital and to honor the memory of Mr. and Mrs. Howell.

Social Capital Builds Quality of Life

Environmental awareness has slowly grown in the last 30 years to the point that Americans now rank the environment among the most pressing of our nation's priorities. The Community Foundation and many of our partners are mobilizing to make Greensboro a greener, cleaner place to live.



From the seed of an idea, an idyllic garden has grown

The Brightwood neighborhood of Greensboro is a diverse, working-class community that is now a more vibrant place to live, thanks to Cove Creek Gardens.

The gardens were started by Nancy Cavanaugh and Julia Blizin to promote the art of horticulture, the conservation of water, and the heightened understanding of plants native to this region. Several years ago, the Community Foundation awarded Cove Creek its first grant and has since extended grants for land acquisition, communications, and a summer camp. We have also connected it with donors, foundations, and other resources that have allowed it to expand both its size and its services to the community.

Cove Creek Gardens is now working with the Brightwood Neighborhood Association to expand from five to 12 acres, and to become part of the Greensboro parks system.

“Right here in our neighborhood there is now a beautiful place for strolling and meditating,” said one community resident. “It is a place for neighbors to meet, and it makes our entire neighborhood a better place to live.”

The Community Foundation helped strengthen previous challenging relationships. Building social capital among the Brightwood neighborhood and Cove Creek Gardens enabled the project to move forward.



Community Grants Program

A key indicator of social capital is the degree to which associations and organizations are involved in helping the community advance. To help organizations participate in community leadership, the Community Foundation awards grants to nonprofit groups, which have identified ways they can play an active part in addressing a particular issue. In 2007, the Community Foundation awarded more than \$345,000 in grants to organizations that stepped forward and developed a program or initiative to meet a community challenge.

The Community Grants Program is funded through unrestricted funds or donations to field-of-interest funds. These donors make money available for new and emergent issues, innovative ideas, or to help the community respond to unforeseen situations or events.

The youth of our community learn to fund their own priorities

Social capital is not only for adults. Neither is the satisfaction that comes from helping others. The Community Foundation, in partnership with Leading To Change, Inc., has hosted the Teen Grantmaking Council since 2005. This year's Council and its grants represented ten high schools in the Greensboro area.

"We were excited to be given the responsibility to turn ideas into reality," said 2006-2007 Council member, Lindsay Smith. "I think we all took this very seriously, and it feels really good to know that our choices made a difference."

The Council awarded more than \$7,000 to area youth organizations during the 2007-2008 school year. Grants included:

- Support for the Disproportionate Minority Youth Contact Youth Ambassadors in their mission to reduce what they have identified as a disproportionate rate of minority contact in the Guilford County Juvenile Justice System.
- A project by the Page High School Playmakers to develop a play and panel discussion to raise awareness about teens of different gender/sexual orientation.
- Assistance for the Greensboro Youth Council's annual project to provide underprivileged teen girls with prom dresses.
- Funding for a project by the Early College at Guilford FIRST Robotics Club to promote science and technology in elementary and middle schools in Guilford County.
- Help for the Southwest Guilford High School CYBER Robotics FIRST Team in developing marketing strategies to increase team participation, membership, and sponsorship.

Young professionals focus on the needs of children

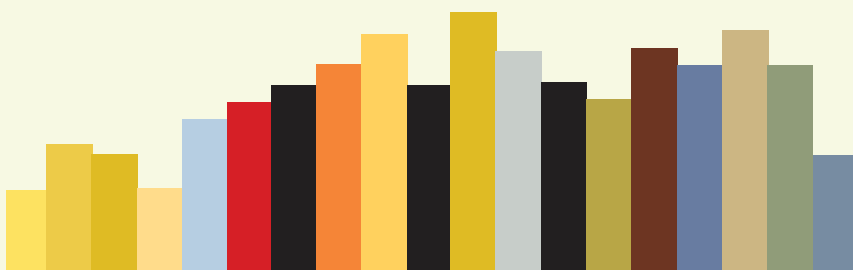
How can a young professional just embarking on a career participate in philanthropy and make a difference in the community? By becoming a member of the Future Fund. “Those who might only be able to give \$250 can pool their resources with others and participate in a grant of \$10,000,” said 2007 Chair Justin Conrad. “Everyone can make a real impact.”

The Future Fund’s two primary goals are to distribute an average of \$50,000 in grants annually and to build its permanent endowment, the Ann Lineweaver Future Fund Endowment, to \$1 million by 2010.

Each year, committee members participate in the selection of a theme for the organization’s efforts and determine the apportionment of grants. In 2007, the theme was service to children, and among the accomplishments were:

- Provided beds for children through the Barnabas Network.
- Supported Hospice and Palliative Care of Greensboro’s work with infants diagnosed with prenatal life-threatening conditions.
- Helped Tristan’s Quest serve children whose parents are in prison.
- Assisted UNCG’s Youth and Family Initiative to provide counseling to children and their parents.
- Contributed to the HandyCapable Network’s efforts to provide computers to low-income families.

Rewarding schools that strive for excellence

The late Hubert B. Humphrey, Jr. served on the board of trustees of the Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation for more than 20 years. To honor his memory, the Reynolds Foundation endowed an annual award for school improvement at the Community Foundation.

The selection process for the award was designed with the input of high school principals and school administrators of Guilford County. Each county high school is judged on its improvement through the school year based on 10 objective performance measures. The award is for \$10,000 to be used at the winning school for professional development among its staff. The most recent winner was Eastern Guilford High School.

“Our goal is to recognize the school that has best committed itself to achievement,” said Joe Crocker of the Reynolds Foundation and chair of the selection committee. “That drive for excellence is what we all loved and remember most about our friend Hugh Humphrey.”

We support our hometown—even if it is thousands of miles away

Some of us have spent most of our lives in Greensboro. Others of us found our way here through good fortune, but we still have a strong connection to our former hometowns.

There are about 200 families in central North Carolina who have made their way here from the city of Mezquital in the state of Durango, Mexico. To support both their new and their traditional communities, they formed a Hometown Association to bolster civic projects in Mexico and in their adopted home.

In 2005, association leaders and the Community Foundation established El Fondo del Patronato Mezquital (The Fund of the Mezquital Sponsorship). Believed to be the first of its kind in North Carolina, this fund receives matching monies from the Mexican government and is also sponsored by the NC Latino Coalition.

“Our current project is the construction of a new facility which serves as both a retirement home and nursing home,” said Maria Rodriquez, Patronato Mezquital fund advisor. “Being able to give in this way not only supports a worthwhile project, but allows us to contribute to the well-being of a community that remains dear to our hearts. It allows us to pool all contributions and be able to efficiently support our projects in Mexico and be involved in our new community.”

Becoming a Donor

Establishing Your Own Fund at the Community Foundation

You can help build social capital by becoming a Community Foundation donor. Establishing your own named charitable fund is not complicated and does not require great wealth. The Community Foundation has a wide range of gifting options, and because we are recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as a public charity, donors receive the maximum tax benefits allowed by law.

Creating a charitable fund for yourself or your family gives you the opportunity to:

- Connect with other donors and leverage your gift to enhance impact on community needs that are important to you;
- Provide ongoing support to your favorite organizations;
- Choose different nonprofits to support each year during your lifetime;
- Identify community needs you would like to address, or take advantage of our staff's expertise to help you focus your efforts on the community's most pressing challenges; and
- Distribute gifts during your lifetime, leave a lasting legacy, or both.

Types of Funds

Donor Advised Funds enable the donor to actively participate in the grantmaking process. Through these funds, a donor can recommend particular charitable projects or organizations to support, making it easy to award grants to multiple nonprofits.

Special Interest and Organizational Endowment Funds are an excellent option for donors who wish to support a specific agency or cause. Many nonprofit organizations establish an endowment fund with the Community Foundation to meet current and future needs. This type of fund provides nonprofits a relatively constant source of annual income and helps them sustain their mission in perpetuity.

Unrestricted Funds are not specifically designated for use by a particular agency, cause, or area of interest. The Community Foundation Board of Directors oversees the use of these funds, setting priorities for supporting needs in the community and determining how grants will be distributed. Unrestricted funds give the Foundation the ability to respond to pressing and changing needs in the community.

Field-of-Interest Funds are often established to support particular interest areas, specific program initiatives, causes or geographic areas. The donor restricts use of funds to a specific area of interest, but flexibility remains to address changing situations.
